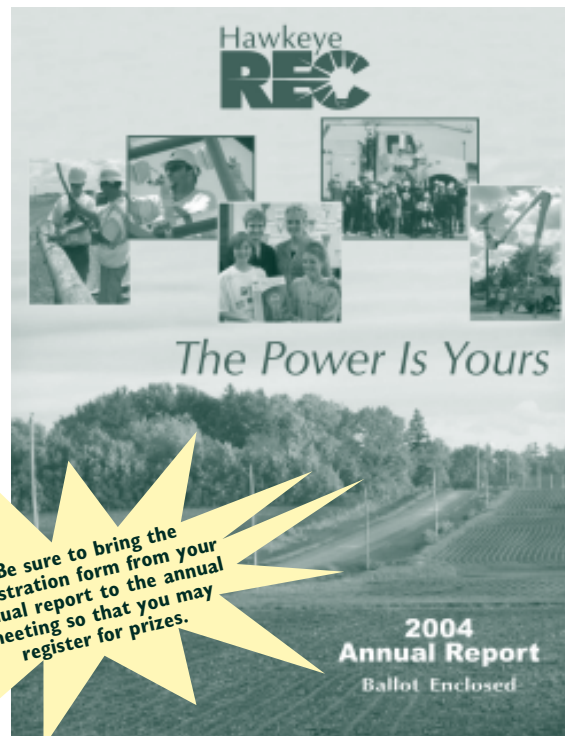

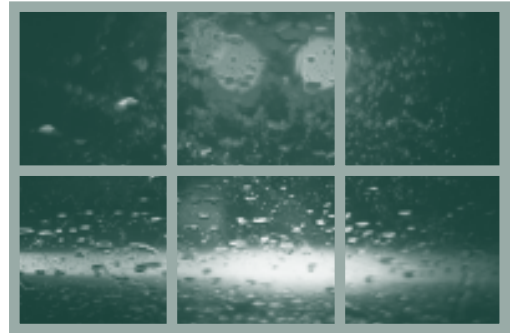
Watch Out for Moisture Problems

Too much moisture in your home can reduce its durability and comfort. Though some moisture is normal in every home, excess moisture can accumulate and damage your home's structure. It can also encourage the growth of mold, mildew, and other organisms that can cause health problems such as allergies and asthma. If you notice musty odors in your home, or if you have dark stains on your walls and ceiling, you should investigate the possibility of moisture accumulation. To prevent this from happening, the EPA recommends the optimum relative humidity range for the well being of the home and for the health of the occupants to be between 30% and 50%. In this day and age, people are spending more of their time indoors (approximately 90%), so the indoor air quality is a vital factor in maintaining healthy lives.

Most homes need ventilation to remove moisture and odors that come from bathing, cooking, and other activities. Bathrooms and kitchens should have operating ventilation fans that are vented to the outdoors. If your home doesn't have such fans, installing them is a very worthwhile home improvement. Your

home will be healthier and drier when you eliminate this excess moisture.

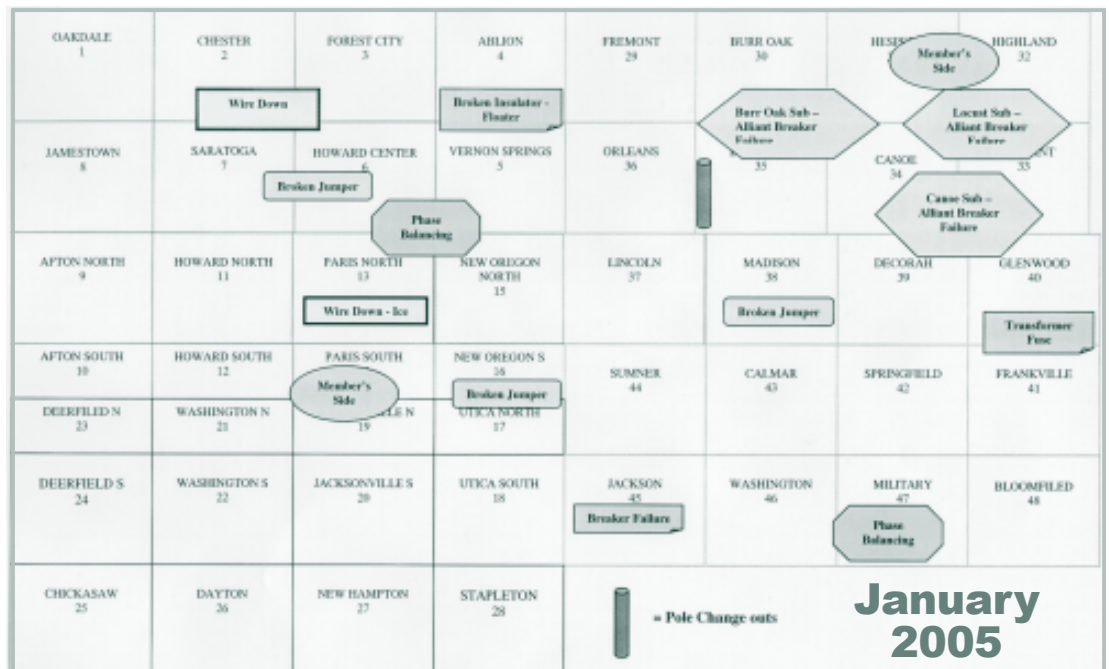
Compared to summer when the moisture content of the air (relative humidity) is an important factor of body discomfort, air moisture has a lesser effect on the human body during outdoor winter activities. However, it is a big factor for winter indoor comfort because it has a direct bearing on health and energy consumption. The colder the outdoor temperature, the more heat must be added indoors for body comfort. However, the heat that is added will cause a drying effect and lower the indoor relative humidity, unless an indoor moisture source is present.



This level of humidity is not always easy to maintain, especially in certain "problem" areas of the home. A dehumidifier is often needed in basements and crawlspaces where humidity can be very high.

An Affordable Alternative

Air Source Heat Pump

An air source heat pump is an affordable alternative for efficient heating and cooling systems in new homes as well as existing homes. It's actually two units in one; an efficient home heating system and an economical air conditioner. The modern air source heat pump operates on clean, efficient and safe electricity. It has no flames or fumes to pollute the air inside your home. Because it requires little energy to operate, it not only conserves our precious natural resources, it conserves your money.

How does the heat pump work?

Heat pumps operate much the same way as your refrigerator works, moving heat using a refrigerant and coils. During the summer months, the pump operates as an air conditioner, removing heat and excess humidity from the home leaving it cool and comfortable. In the winter, the process is simply reversed. The heat pump's outside unit captures heat that exists naturally in the atmosphere and transfers it to the inside unit where it is compressed to warm your home. Most heat pumps deliver conditioned air to the home using existing ductwork.

Since heat pumps move rather than generate heat, they can be extremely efficient, delivering more than three times as much heat as they consume in energy. Air source heat pumps are easy to install in new construction or as replacements to older inefficient fossil fuel heating systems. Also, air

source heat pumps are the ideal replacement systems for aging central air conditioners.

Add-on Heat Pumps

Add-on heat pumps can be combined with natural gas, propane, or oil-fired heating systems. During the heating season, when the outdoor temperatures drop below zero or below the "economic balance point" of the heat pump, the heat pump turns off and the fossil fuel furnace provides heat for the home.

The add-on heat pump unit is popular for installation on older homes with central systems that were not previously air conditioned, or for homes whose cooling systems needs replacing and the furnace is still in good shape. Besides providing air conditioning, add-on heat pumps increase the "overall efficiency" of the heating system because both the heat pump and the fossil furnaces are operating at their "optimal efficiency" levels.

Air source heat pumps are 100%+ efficient!

Hawkeye is pleased to offer five \$500 scholarships this year. Hawkeye will award the scholarships through area Dollars for Scholars organizations.

Who is Eligible to Receive a Scholarship?

Any graduating high school senior, whose parents or guardians are members of the Cooperative are eligible.

The applicant must be a student who is enrolled or planning to enroll, in a full-time graduate or undergraduate course of study at an accredited college, university or vocational/technical school in the fall of 2005. The

applicant must be a U.S. citizen.

How Do You Apply?

In order to be considered for the 2005 scholarship, completed applications must be received by the Cooperative no later than April 16, 2005. Applications are available at your area high school guidance counselor office or at the REC office in Cresco. The application can also be downloaded and printed on Hawkeye's website at www.hawkeyerec.com.

Return the completed application to the Cooperative with the following:

- ▼ Copy of the student's high school transcript

- ▼ Letter of recommendation from a teacher or school administrator

Students “Get Charged” About Electricity!

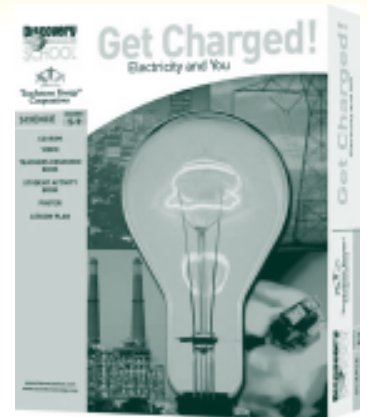

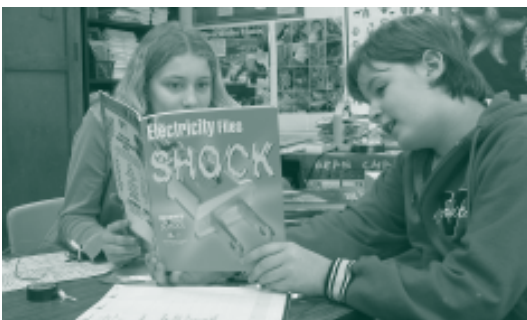

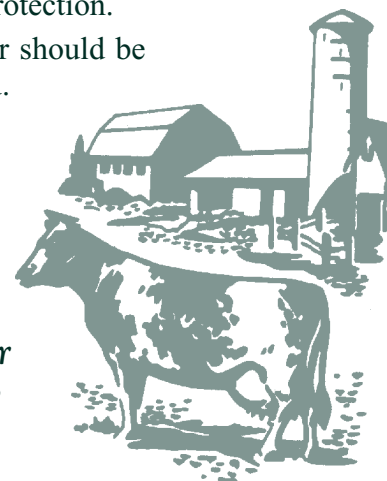
Electric Waterer Safety

Having an ice-free source of water is essential to any livestock farm. Like all farm equipment, electrically-heated waterers require attention to ensure their safe and efficient use. Safety in operation depends on proper installation and grounding. Make certain that you install waterers with the following guidelines:

- ◆ The heater should be listed by Underwriters Laboratory (UL) or another recognized testing organization. It should be installed according to the manufacturer's directions.
- ◆ The waterer should be installed on a firm platform or foundation incorporating an equipotential plane.

- ◆ The waterer should be wired in accordance with the National Electrical Code.
- ◆ Every waterer should have a disconnecting switch with over-current protection.
- ◆ All metal parts on the waterer should be bonded together and grounded.

Nomination by Petition

Any member of Hawkeye REC may be nominated for a director position by means of a petition. The petition must contain the signatures of not less than 1% of the Cooperative membership, therefore requiring fifty (50) or more signatures. The petition form is available at Hawkeye's office and must be received by the Secretary of the Cooperative not less than 20 days prior to the meeting. Hawkeye's Annual meeting is April 6, and for the purpose of publishing the March Annual Report, the petitions need to be received at the Cooperative office on or before February 21, 2005. Hawkeye will verify all the signatures. Please submit the signed petition to Tom Miller, CEO.

Director Qualifications

As outlined in Hawkeye's Bylaws, minimal qualifications for a director are:

- ◆ Must be a cooperative member.
- ◆ Must be a bona fide resident living within the geographic boundaries of the Cooperative's service area.
- ◆ Must receive electrical service from the cooperative in the district from which they have been nominated and elected.
- ◆ Must not be employed by or financially interested in a competing enterprise or business selling electric energy, supplies, or services to the cooperative.
- ◆ Must not be a close relative of an incumbent director or of an employee of the cooperative at the time of his/her election to the board.

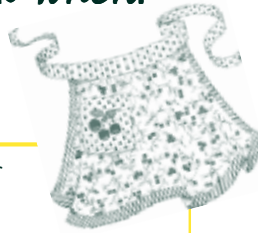

April - Springtime Salads

Refrigerator Rolls



2 pkgs. dry yeast	6½-7 c. sifted flour
2 c. warm water or warm potato water	1 egg
½ c. sugar	¼ c. soft shortening
	2 t. salt

Dissolve yeast in water (110-115 degrees). Add sugar, salt and ½ of the flour. Beat thoroughly for 2 minutes. Add egg and shortening. Beat and add remaining flour gradually by hand. Dough will be stiff. Mix until smooth. Cover with damp cloth, place in refrigerator. When dough rises to top of container, punch down. 2 hours before baking, cut off amount needed. Roll dough to ½" thick into Oblong 12" wide. Spread with soft butter. Fold over in half, cut into ½ strips. Shape into knots, twists, or figure eights. Brush with melted butter. Let rise until doubled in size (1½-2 hours). Bake 12-15 minutes at 350 degrees. Twists may be brushed with butter and rolled in brown sugar for a sweet roll. Very tasty.

In my bread baking days, I baked every day except Sunday. These refrigerator rolls did well on days that perhaps someone dropped in for lunch or dinner, or children were extra hungry and we were short of bread. They were a good filler, and so handy. They have to be watched, as even in cool surroundings, the dough rose. One might open the refrigerator door and have a gush of risen bread dough pop out!

Drobinky

1 c. flour	½ t. salt
1 rounded t. butter	1 egg

Stir ingredients with a large fork until it forms a soft ball. Knead on floured board until easily handled, but not extremely stiff. Using a kitchen shears, cut off small pieces into boiling broth. Cook 10-15 minutes, until tender.

Drobinky works well in chicken or beef broth and are wonderful in potato soup. Boil them when potatoes are half cooked and before one adds the milk.

Smorem

(great with fresh strawberries)

4 eggs	½ t. salt
1 c. milk	1 c. flour (more or less)
1 T. sugar	

Beat eggs, add sugar and salt. Mix well and combine gradually with the flour until batter is like thin pancake batter. Using a deep heavy skillet, add a good layer of grease, oil or shortening. Heat skillet to hot and add batter. When batter shows brown around the edges, flip the Smorem and allow the other side to brown. Then start chopping, do not allow to burn. Chop using a knife or sharp edged turner. Soon you will have a pan of browned kernels of dough, each about the size of a dime. Serve immediately. Good with syrup, jam, honey, or well sweetened strawberries.

Jiternice

40 lbs. cooked pork
½ c. salt
5 boxes of pearl barley, cooked
8 heads of garlic, cut up
8 c. of onion chunks
2 boxes poultry seasoning
6 loaves of dried bread
½ c. black pepper

Grind cooked pork, bread, onion and garlic together. Add cooked barley, poultry seasoning, salt and pepper. Stuff into casings. Punch several holes in each ring with a needle. Cook in boiling water until rings float to cook the casings. This is a large recipe and makes many rings of Jiternice.
